DIRECTORS' REPORT

The directors present their report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2024.

Principal activity

Cert. Holdings Limited ("the Company") is an insurance holding company domiciled in Guernsey. The Company changed its name from Manzillo Holdings Limited to Cert. Holdings Limited ("Cert. Holdings") on the 2nd of May 2025. The Company's subsidiaries include, Red Sands Group Holdings Limited ("RSG"), Cert. Insurance Group Limited ("CIG") formerly Red Sands Services Limited, Nordic Guarantee Forsakringsaktiebolag ("Nordic"), Lombard Australia Holdings Pty Limited ("LAH") and Polar Risk Managers AB ("Polar").

Red Sands Insurance Company (Europe) Limited ("RSE") and Red Sands Life Assurance Company (Europe) Limited ("RSL"), subsidiaries of CIG from 1st July 2025 (previously RSG), hold insurance licences issued by the Gibraltar Financial Services Commission ("GFSC") to carry out general and long-term insurance business in Gibraltar. Since 1 January 2021, RSL has ceased selling new policies as a result of the United Kingdom and Gibraltar's exit from the European Union, and therefore until 28 June 2024 focused on providing reinsurance capacity and running off its legacy books of business. From 28 June 2024, RSL no longer retroceded policies in Poland and is therefore, in solvent run-off with no new business being written either directly or indirectly. On 7 January 2025, at the request of RSL, the GFSC issued a direction that RSL must not enter into new contracts of insurance business, including renewals, with immediate effect and gave notice that the RSL's Part 7 Permission had been varied to remove the regulated activity of effecting contracts of insurance.

CIG was incorporated in the United Kingdom on 3 January 2024. CIG supports each entity in the Group via sharing of systems, people and knowledge as required and appropriate and acquired a 30% interest in LomHold (Pty) on 6 December 2024, being the holding company of a South African general insurer, Lombard Insurance Company Limited. On 1st July 2025, the shares held by RSG in RSE and RSL were transferred to CIG and RSG is in the process of being dissolved. Similarly, on 15th August 2025, the shares held by the Company in Nordic were also transferred to CIG. Subject to regulatory approval in Australia, CIG will hold the investments into each of the insurance licences currently held directly under Cert. Holdings. On 16th July 2025, Red Sands Services Limited changed its name to Cert. Insurance Group Limited.

LAH is a holding company for the Assetinsure Group which is an insurance group regulated by the Australian Prudential Regulation Authority ("APRA") providing specialist insurance products mainly to the Australian market.

Nordic's main activity is the issuance of guarantees into the construction industry in the Nordic market and in Spain.

Polar is a holding company which held the investment into DP Bonds Pty Ltd ("DP Bonds"), whose principal activity is marketing, distribution and operational functions relating to the issue of deposit guarantees. DP Bonds was disposed of in December 2024.

The Company and its subsidiaries form the consolidated position of Cert. Holdings Limited ("the Group").

DIRECTORS' REPORT

Review of business

The results of the Group for the year are shown in the Consolidated Statement of Comprehensive Income on pages 10 to 12. The shareholders' funds total £203.4m (2023: £145.9m). No dividends were declared in the year (2023: £2.2m).

Throughout 2024, the Group has maintained its strategic objective of supporting its established distribution partners to service its target markets and deliver good customer outcomes across its lines of business. This has continued to produce positive results.

On the general insurance side of the business, the Group's pet products line of business has continued to grow during the current year and has performed well despite the continuing competitive pressures in the sector, as well as inflationary pressures which, while seemingly abating a little through 2024, continue to affect consumer behaviours. Our travel book continues to perform well and our property book has performed positively in the current year. Other lines of business, notably insurance backed guarantees, have experienced difficult trading environments in the current year due to the failure of a large national contractor late last year. The Group has also seen growth from its credit insurance and surety businesses.

During late 2023, the Financial Conduct Authority ("FCA") wrote to insurers expressing concern with the value Guaranteed Asset Protection ("GAP") products provided to consumers. After various communications with the FCA on this matter, RSE, alongside other insurers of UK GAP insurance, signed a Voluntary Undertaking to take reasonable steps to ensure that GAP products are not marketed or distributed in the UK until the FCA are content RSE can demonstrate value in its GAP insurance products. The Voluntary Undertaking was effective from 7th February 2024 to 3 June 2025. This has had a detrimental effect on RSE's position in the GAP insurance market, but more importantly, this has provided an opportunity for RSE to accelerate its planned changes to its operating model to ensure it is well placed to meet the heightened regulatory and compliance risks in personal lines insurance more generally.

In Q3 2023, Animal Friends Insurance Services Ltd ("AFI") was subject to a change of control. AFI is one of RSE's distribution partners and from 27 February 2025 RSE will no longer write new or renewal business in relation to AFI. Additionally, from 1 January 2025 RSE has entered into a reinsurance to close arrangement to cede 100% of all claims payable and future premium of the remaining AFI book. Additionally, RSE entered into a 50% quota share arrangement from 1 January 2024 with respect of its remaining pet book.

The directors have considered the impact of the Voluntary Undertaking and the cessation of the AFI book in its latest business projections and are satisfied that the Group is well placed to manage the impact of these going forward.

Review of business (continued)

Overall, the Group's gross written premium from general business increased by 6% (2023: 15%) from £485.2m to £514.4m.

On the long-term side of the business, the Group has ceased selling new policies as a result of the United Kingdom and Gibraltar's exit from the European Union ("EU"), and therefore until 28th June 2024, focused on providing reinsurance capacity and running off its legacy books of business. The Group has fully engaged with the appropriate EU regulators in the host state territories to ensure contract continuity. From 28th June 2024, the Group no longer retroceded policies in Poland and entered solvent run-off. As a result of this change in the Group's long-term business activities, the Group saw a decrease in gross written premium from long-term business (£12.0m in 2024 compared to £17.8m in 2023).

Gross technical provisions with respect to the life business have increased in the current year due to the inclusion of a £3.3m overhead expense reserve to provide for a minimum level of overhead expense to support the business over a projected run-off period of fifty years.

The Group engages the services of Milliman LLP, as the independent reviewing actuary, who provides the Group with a review of the calculation of the Long-Term Business Provisions ("LTBP"). Milliman LLP also provide actuarial services in the assessment of the appropriateness of the technical provisions for Solvency II.

In December 2023, Generali signed an agreement with 4LifeDirect for the purchase of 100% ownership of the life insurance distribution company in Poland. As part of the transaction, the Company commuted its retrocession treaty and therefore from 28 June 2024, the Group no longer retroceded policies in Poland.

The Group's commitment to its policyholders is reflected in its claims processes and payments. During the course of 2024, the Group paid out £267.3m worth of claims to its policyholders (2023: £266.6m).

The insurance entities in the Group maintain individual investment portfolios managed based on their activities, risk profiles and business planning activities. Total investment returns during 2024 were £18.8m (2023: £12.3m) reflecting a positive investment performance in the current year. The Group's investment strategy is not to seek to time the market, with normal market fluctuations being planned into the investment thesis and monitored with our independent investment consultants. These types of shock are anticipated and mitigated within the Group's investment strategy which remains unchanged.

The directors are pleased with the development of the business and the results achieved in 2024.

As always, the directors look forward to continuing to support and work closely with their current distribution and reinsurance partners.

Principal risks and uncertainties

Although inflationary pressures appear to be easing, they continue to affect consumer behaviours in the Group's key markets and the ability of individuals to continue to utilise insurance products as a means of protection, given the financial pressures placed upon them. Given the ongoing macro-economic, geopolitical outlook and heightened economic uncertainty, the Group continues to monitor inflation in relation to claims experience and in particular the impact on policyholder renewal persistency.

The principal risks and uncertainties arising from the Group's general insurance business arise from fluctuations in timing, frequency and severity of claims compared to its expectations and inaccurate pricing of policies sold. Due to the heightened regulatory environment, regulatory risk and conduct risk have developed into key risks for the Group and the Group is making changes to its operating model to ensure it is well placed to meet these risks. The principal risks and uncertainties arising from the Group's life insurance business are insurance risk and financial risk. The Company is exposed to financial instruments risks in particular, interest rate risk on cash flows, price risk, credit risk, liquidity risk and currency risk.

The Group is also exposed to financial risks primarily through its investments, reinsurance assets and policyholder liabilities. These risks are discussed in note 12 to the financial statements.

The Group maintains a very strong statement of financial position and prudent liquidity position and therefore is well positioned to see through any further deterioration of the macro-economic backdrop arising from these risks.

Financial risk management objectives and policies

The risk management objectives and policies are driven by the need to protect the regulatory capital position of the individual licenced entities within the Group, to meet insurance obligations to policyholders as they fall due and to have the financial strength to grow the business.

Information on the use of the financial instruments by the Group and its management of financial risk is disclosed in note 12 to the financial statements.

Dividends

No dividends were declared in the year (2023: £2.2m).

Going concern

The accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis. In considering the appropriateness of this assumption, the Board of Directors or the Group's sub-committees (as appropriate) have reviewed the Group's and the Company's latest projections for the next twelve months and beyond. The Group has stress tested a number of ultimate outcome scenarios at subsidiary level and is satisfied that the Group will continue to operate on a going concern basis.

As a result of this review the Board of Directors' have satisfied themselves that the Group and the Company have adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and believe that it is appropriate to prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis.

Statement of directors' responsibilities

The directors have prepared these financial statements, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Company and the Group and of the profit or loss for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the directors:

- · select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- · make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Company will continue in business.

The directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Company. They have general responsibility for taking such steps as are reasonably open to them to safeguard the assets of the Company and to prevent and detect fraud and other irregularities.

Auditors

The retiring auditors are EY Limited who are eligible for re-appointment.

Report on the Audit of the Consolidated Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the consolidated financial statements of Cert. Holdings Limited (previously 'Manzillo Holdings Limited') and its subsidiaries (the 'Group'), which comprise the consolidated statement of financial position as at 31 December 2024, and the consolidated statement of comprehensive income, the company and consolidated statement of changes in equity and the company and consolidated statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the consolidated financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying consolidated financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the state of the Group's affairs as at 31 December 2024 and of the Group's profit and cash flows for the year then ended; and
- have been properly prepared in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102 and 103, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland, as applied pursuant to the requirements of the Gibraltar Companies Act' ('FRS 102 and 103').

This report, including the opinion, has been prepared for and only for the Group's members as a body and for no other purpose. We do not, in giving these opinions, accept or assume responsibility for any other purpose or to any other person to whom this report is shown or into whose hands it may come save where expressly agreed by our prior consent in writing.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing ('ISAs'). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Company in accordance with the International Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (including International Independence Standards) ('IESBA Code') together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Gibraltar, and we have fulfilled our ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the IESBA Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Other Information

Other information consists of the information included in the Annual Report, other than the consolidated financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. The directors are responsible for the other information.

Our opinion on the consolidated financial statements does not cover the other information and, except to the extent otherwise explicitly stated in this report, we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the consolidated financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the consolidated financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the year ended 31 December 2024

1 Company information

Cert. Holdings Limited is registered in Guernsey and is a company limited by share capital. The registered office is 3rd Floor, 1 Le Truchot, St Peter Port, Guernsey GY1 1WD. The Company changed its name from Manzillo Holdings Limited to Cert. Holdings Limited on the 2nd of May 2025. The financial statements cover those of the individual entity and its subsidiaries on a consolidated basis and are prepared as at and for the year ended 31 December 2024. The principal subsidiaries of Cert. Holdings Limited are Red Sands Group Holdings Limited, Red Sands Services Limited, Lombard Australia Holdings Pty Limited, Nordic Guarantee Forsakringsaktiebolag and Polar Risk Managers AB.

2 Basis of preparation

These financial statements have been prepared following the guidance under Financial Reporting Standards ("FRS") 102 and 103.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for certain financial instruments which are measured at fair value or amortised cost, as specified in the accounting policies below.

The financial statements are presented in Pound Sterling which is the presentation and functional currency of the Group and rounded to the nearest £, or the nearest thousand (£'000) where indicated.

Going concern

The accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis. In considering the appropriateness of this assumption, the Board of Directors or the Group's sub-committees (as appropriate) have reviewed the Group's and the Company's latest projections for the next twelve months and beyond. The Group has stress tested a number of ultimate outcome scenarios at subsidiary level and is satisfied that the Group will continue to operate on a going concern basis.

As a result of this review the Board of Directors' have satisfied themselves that the Group and the Company have adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and believe that it is appropriate to prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis.

Basis of consolidation

The Group consolidated financial statements include the financial statements of the Company and all of its subsidiary undertakings together with the Group's share of the results of associates made up to 31 December 2024.

A subsidiary is an entity controlled by the Group. Control is the power to govern the financial and operating policies of an entity so as to obtain benefits from its activities. Where a subsidiary has different accounting policies to the Group, adjustments are made to those subsidiary financial statements to apply the Group's accounting policies when preparing the consolidated financial statements.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the year ended 31 December 2024

2 Basis of preparation (continued)

An associate is an entity, being neither a subsidiary nor a joint venture, in which the Group holds a long-term interest and where the Group has significant influence. The Group considers that it has significant influence where it has the power to participate in the financial and operating decisions of the associate. The results of associates are accounted for using the equity method of accounting.

Any subsidiary undertakings or associates sold or acquired during the year are included up to, or from, the dates of change of control or change of significant influence respectively.

Where control of a subsidiary is achieved in stages, the initial acquisition that gave the Group control is accounted for as a business combination. Thereafter, where the Group increases its controlling interest in the subsidiary the transaction is treated as a transaction between equity holders. Any difference between the fair value of the consideration paid and the carrying amount of the non-controlling interest acquired is recognised directly in equity. No changes are made to the carrying value of assets, liabilities or provisions for contingent liabilities.

All intra-Group transactions, balances, income and expenses are eliminated on consolidation.

'Non-controlling interests' represents the non-controlling interest's share of the net amount of the identifiable assets, liabilities and provisions for contingent liabilities of the acquiree at the acquisition date as well as the non-controlling interest's share of post-acquisition profit or loss. Subsequent to acquisition, non-controlling interests consist of amount attributed to such interest at initial recognition and the non-controlling interests' share of changes in equity since the acquisition date.

3 Accounting policies

3.1 Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported for assets and liabilities as at the date of the statement of financial position and the amounts reported for revenues and expenses during the year. However, the nature of estimation means that actual outcomes could differ from those estimates. The following are the key sources of estimation uncertainties and areas where judgements made have had the most significant effect:

Non-life insurance contract technical provisions

The Group's most critical accounting estimate is the ultimate liability arising from claims made under insurance. Estimates have to be made for both the expected ultimate cost of claims reported at the reporting date and for the expected ultimate cost of claims incurred, but not yet reported at the reporting date ('IBNR'). It can take a significant amount of time before the ultimate claims cost can be established with certainty and for some type of policies, IBNR claims form a majority of the liability in the statement of financial position.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the year ended 31 December 2024

3 Accounting policies (continued)

3.1 Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty (continued)

Non-life insurance contract technical provisions (continued)

The provision for claims outstanding is made on an individual basis and is based on the ultimate cost of all claims notified but not settled by the date of the statement of financial position. The provision also includes the estimated cost of claims incurred but not reported at the date of the statement of financial position based on statistical methods.

The estimation of IBNR is generally subject to a greater degree of uncertainty than the estimation of the cost of settling claims already notified to the Group, where more information about the claim event is generally available. Claims IBNR may often not be apparent to the insurer until many years after the event giving rise to the claim has happened. Classes of business where the IBNR proportion of the total reserve is high will typically display greater variations between the initial estimates and the final outcomes because of the greater degree of difficulty of estimating those reserves. Classes of business where claims are typically reported relatively quickly after the claim event will tend to display lower levels of volatility. In calculating the estimated cost of unpaid claims the Group uses a variety of estimation techniques, generally based upon statistical analyses of historic experience, which assumes that the development pattern of the current claims will be consistent with past experience.

Similar judgements, estimates and assumptions are used in the assessment of adequacy of provisions for unearned premium. Judgement is also required in determining whether the pattern of insurance service provided by a contract requires amortisation of unearned premium on a basis other than time apportionment.

Further details are given in Notes 4 and 5.

Life insurance contract technical provisions

The liability for life insurance contracts is either based on current assumptions or on assumptions established at the inception of the contract, reflecting the best estimate at the time increased with a margin for risk and adverse deviation. All contracts are subject to a liability adequacy test, which reflect management's best current estimate of future cash flows.

The main assumptions used relate to mortality, morbidity, longevity, investment returns, expenses, lapse and surrender rates and discount rates. The Group bases mortality and morbidity on standard industry mortality tables which reflect historical experiences, adjusted when appropriate to reflect the Group's unique risk exposure, product characteristics, target markets and own claims severity and frequency experiences. For those contracts that insure risk related to longevity, prudent allowance is made for expected future mortality improvements, as well as wide ranging changes to life style, these could result in significant changes to the expected future mortality exposure.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the year ended 31 December 2024

3 Accounting policies (continued)

3.1 Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty (continued)

Life insurance contract technical provisions (continued)

Estimates are also made as to future investment income arising from the assets backing life insurance contracts. These estimates are based on current market returns, as well as expectations about future economic and financial developments.

Assumptions on future expenses are based on current expense levels, adjusted for expected expense inflation, if appropriate. Lapse and surrender rates are based on the Group's historical experience of lapses and surrenders. Further details are contained in note 12.

The expense provision covers future overhead costs and is based on long-term projections. A key judgement in this calculation is the estimation of future overheads and the inflation assumptions applied. While overhead expenses have historically been stable and reasonably predictable, inflation presents a higher level of uncertainty due to its market-driven nature. Notably, actual overhead inflation has been consistently lower than the Bank of England's published Consumer Price Index (CPI). To account for this uncertainty associated with inflation, the inflation assumption used in the provision includes a degree of prudence to ensure the expense provision is adequate to meet future overhead expenses.

Taxation

Management estimation is required to determine the amount of deferred tax assets that can be recognised, based upon likely timing and level of future taxable profits together with an assessment of the effect of future tax planning strategies. Further details are contained in Note 11.

Operating lease commitments

The Group has entered into commercial property leases. The classification of such leases as operating or finance leases require the Group to determine, based on an evaluation of the terms and conditions of the arrangements, whether it retains or acquires the significant risks and rewards of ownership of these assets and accordingly whether the lease requires an asset and liability to be recognised in the statement of financial position. Further details are contained in Note 26.

Reinsurance assets

Assets arising from reinsurance recoveries are computed using the same methods as technical provisions above. In addition, the recoverability of these assets is assessed on a periodic basis to ensure that the balance is reflective of the amounts that will ultimately be received, taking into consideration factors such as credit risk. Impairment is recognised where there is objective evidence that amounts due may not be received and these amounts can be reliably measured. Further details are contained in note 12.

3.2 Significant accounting policies

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to amortise the cost less estimated residual value, of each asset over its expected useful life from the date the asset comes into use, as follows:

· Leasehold improvements

- six years straight line

· Plant and equipment

three to five years straight line

Motor vehicles

- three years straight line

Land and building

Land and building is held as an investment property, to earn rentals or for capital appreciation or both, is initially recognised at cost and subsequently re-measured at fair value with changes in fair value recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

Full valuations in accordance with the relevant guidance notes are made by independent, professionally qualified valuers every three years.

Investment property is derecognised on disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal.

Intangible assets

Intangible assets are valued at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses and are amortised over three to five years. Amortisation is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful life of the intangible asset. Useful lives of intangible assets are reviewed annually. Amortisable intangible assets are amortised from the date on which they are available for use

Business combinations and goodwill

Business combinations are accounted for by applying the purchase method.

The cost of a business combination is the fair value of the consideration given, liabilities incurred or assumed and of equity instruments issued plus the costs directly attributable to the business combination. Where control is achieved in stages the cost is the consideration at the date of each transaction.

On acquisition of a business, fair values are attributed to the identifiable assets, liabilities and contingent liabilities unless the fair value cannot be measured reliably, in which case the value is incorporated in goodwill. Where the fair value of contingent liabilities cannot be reliably measured they are disclosed on the same basis as other contingent liabilities.

3 Accounting policies (continued)

3.2 Significant accounting policies (continued)

Business combinations and goodwill (continued)

Goodwill recognised represents the excess of the fair value and directly attributable costs of the purchase consideration over the fair values to the Group's interest in the identifiable net assets, liabilities and contingent liabilities acquired.

On acquisition, goodwill is allocated to cash-generating units ('CGU') that are expected to benefit from the combination.

Goodwill is amortised over its expected useful life. Where the Group is unable to make a reliable estimate of useful life, goodwill is amortised over a period not exceeding ten years. The useful economic life of ten years has been applied to positive goodwill held at the balance sheet date and four years has been applied to negative goodwill held at the balance sheet date. The useful economic life of negative goodwill is based on the period over which the value of the underlying business acquired is expected to exceed the values of the acquired identifiable net assets. Goodwill is assessed for impairment when there are indicators of impairment and any impairment is charged to the income statement. Reversals of impairment are recognised when the reasons for the impairment no longer apply.

Financial investments

Financial investments comprise the following:

Derivative instruments

The Group uses forward foreign currency contracts to reduce exposure to foreign exchange rates. Derivative financial instruments are initially measured at fair value on the date on which a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently measured at fair value through the statement of comprehensive income. Derivatives are recognised as assets when the fair value is positive and as liabilities when the fair value is negative.

The fair value of the forward currency contracts is calculated by reference to current forward exchange contracts with maturity profiles. The Group does not undertake any hedge accounting transactions.

Shares and other variable yield securities and unit in unit trusts and debt securities and other fixed income. These investments are recognised initially at fair value which is normally the transaction price but excluding any transaction costs. Subsequently, they are measured at fair value through the statement of comprehensive income except for those equity investments that are not publicly traded and whose fair value cannot otherwise be measured reliably which are recognised at cost less impairment until a reliable measure of fair value becomes available.

If a reliable measure of fair value is no longer available, the instrument's fair value on the last date the instrument was reliably measurable is treated as the cost of the instrument.

Financial investments (continued)

Unlisted investment positions

Investments in positions which are not traded on an active market are values based on the expected rate of return, subject to impairment based on investment manager reports or financial information which indicate that the expected rate of return may not be appropriate. In cases where an expected rate of return cannot be reliably measured, these are valued at the lower of cost less a provision for applicable impairment.

Loan notes receivables which are basic instruments are initially recorded at the present value of future payments discounted at the market rate of interest of similar loan. Subsequently, they are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Fair value of financial assets

The Group uses the following hierarchy for determining the fair value of financial instruments by valuation technique:

- (i) Level 1: quoted (unadjusted) prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities. Quoted in an active market in this context means quoted prices are readily and regularly available and those prices represent actual and regularly occurring market transactions on an arm's length basis. The quoted price is usually the bid price.
- (ii) Level 2: when quoted prices are unavailable the instrument is valued using inputs that are observable either directly or indirectly including quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets, inputs that are observable such as interest rates and yield curves observable at commonly quoted intervals, implied volatility or credit spreads and market-corroborated inputs.
- (iii) Level 3: when observable inputs are not available, unobservable inputs are used to measure fair value by use of valuation techniques. The objective of using the valuation technique is to estimate what the fair value would have been on the measurement date.

See Note 17 for details of financial instruments classified by fair value hierarchy.

Investment in subsidiaries

Investment in subsidiaries is measured at fair value based on the underlying net asset value. The directors believe that this is a reasonable approximation of fair value of the investment as at the reporting date.

Investments in participating interests

The Group's investments in participating interests comprises investments in associates. Associates are those entities in which the Company has significant influence, but not control over or joint control over the financial and operating policies of the entity. Interests in associates are accounted for using the equity method. They are initially recognised at cost, which includes transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition, the financial statements include the Company's share of the profit and loss and other comprehensive income of the equity-accounted investee, until the date on which significant influence ceases.

Increase in controlling interest in a subsidiary

When the Group increases its controlling interest in a subsidiary, the identifiable assets, liabilities and provision for contingent liabilities of the subsidiary are not revalued to fair value and no additional goodwill is recognised at the date the controlling interest is increased. The Group treats changes in controlling interest in a subsidiary, which do not result in a loss of control, as transactions with equity holders in their capacity as equity holders. The carrying amount of the non-controlling interest is adjusted to reflect the change in the Company's interest in the subsidiary's net assets and any difference between the amount by which the non-controlling interest is adjusted and the fair value of the consideration paid or received is recognised directly in equity. The Group does not record a gain or loss on these changes and no further movements on the carrying amounts of assets, including goodwill, or liabilities as a result of such transaction are recognised.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash at bank and in hand on the statement of financial position comprise cash at bank and in hand without

For purposes of the statement of cash flow, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash at bank and in hand and deposits with credit institutions, net of any outstanding bank overdrafts.

No reconciliation of net debt has been presented as the Group has no material debt other than subordinated loan notes.

Employee benefits

Wages, salaries and annual leave

Liabilities for employee benefits for wages and salaries (including non-monetary benefits), and annual leave representing present obligations resulting from employees' services provided up to the reporting date. Current amounts are calculated based on the remuneration rates that are expected to be paid and are not discounted. Any non-current amounts are discounted to their current value.

Employee benefits (continued)

Long service leave

The provision for employee benefits for long service leave represents the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made resulting from employees' services provided up to reporting date. The provision is calculated using expected future increases in wage and salary rates and expected settlement dates based on turnover history and is discounted using the rates attaching to Australian corporate bonds at reporting date which most closely match the terms of maturity of the related liabilities. The unwinding of the discount is treated as long service leave expense.

Defined contribution plans

Obligations for contributions to defined contribution pension plans are recognised as an expense in profit or loss as incurred.

Investment income

Dividends are recognised when the investments to which they relate are declared 'ex-dividend'. Rent is recognised on an accruals basis. Interest income is recognised on a time proportionate basis taking into account effective interest yield.

Realised gains and losses represent the difference between net sales proceeds and purchase price and are recognised through the statement of comprehensive income. Unrealised gains and losses on investments represent the difference between the current value at the date of the statement of financial position and their purchase price and are recognised through the statement of comprehensive income.

Debtors and creditors

Debtors and creditors, other than those arising from insurance and reinsurance contracts, with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in the income statement in other operating expenses.

Deferred consideration

Deferred consideration is initially recorded at the transaction cost. The consideration is amortised using the appropriate actuarial methodologies on a best estimate basis for future expected outcomes. The income realised is based on the difference between the actual experience against the expected outcomes.

Foreign currencies

Functional and presentation currency

Items included in these financial statements are measured and presented using Pound Sterling (£), the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Company and the Group operates (the 'functional currency'), which is also the presentation currency of the Company and the Group.

Foreign currencies (continued)

Transactions and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at year-end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

In respect to assets and liabilities arising from the Group's separately identifiable foreign business, the assets and liabilities are translated at the exchange rate ruling at the date of the statement of financial position. Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction. All differences are taken to the statement of comprehensive income.

Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount reported in the statement of financial position only where there is a legally enforceable right to offset the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Leased assets

At inception the Group assesses agreements that transfer the right to use assets as lessee. The assessment considers whether the arrangement is, or contains, a lease based on the substance of the arrangement.

Leases of assets that transfer substantially all the risks and rewards incidental to ownership are classified as finance leases. Leases that do not transfer all the risks and rewards of ownership are classified as operating leases. Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the statement of comprehensive income on a straight-line basis over the period of the lease and the asset is not recognised in the statement of financial position.

Finance leases

The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease, or, if that rate cannot be readily determined, the incremental borrowing rate. The lease liability is subsequently measured by increasing the carrying amount to reflect the interest cost on the lease liability (using the effective interest method), by decreasing the carrying amount by the lease payments as they are made and remeasured to reflect any changes or reassessments of circumstances.

Finance leases (continued)

The right-of-use asset is initially measured at an amount equal to the fair value of the leased asset or, if lower, the present value of the minimum lease payments, determined at the inception of the lease. Any initial direct costs of the lessee (incremental costs that are directly attributable to negotiating and arranging a lease) are added to the amount recognised as an asset.

The asset is subsequently measured at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses and adjusted for certain remeasurements of the lease liability. Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of the asset's useful life and the lease term.

Lease incentives

Incentives received to enter into an operating lease are credited to the statement of comprehensive income, to reduce the lease expense, on a straight-line basis over the period of the lease.

Dividends

Interim dividends are recognised when paid and final dividends are booked as a liability when they are approved by the members passing a written resolution.

Taxation and deferred tax

Current taxation

Current taxation is provided for on the basis of tax rates and tax laws that have been enacted or substantially enacted at the year-end date.

Deferred taxation

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities for financial reporting purposes and the amounts used for taxation purposes. The following temporary differences are not provided for: goodwill not deductible for taxation purposes; the initial recognition of assets or liabilities that affect neither accounting nor taxable profit; nor any differences relating to controlled entities to the extent that they will probably not reverse in the foreseeable future. The amount of deferred tax provided is based on the expected manner of realisation or settlement of the carrying amount of assets and liabilities using tax rates substantively enacted at the reporting date.

A deferred tax asset is recognised only to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profits will be available against which the asset can be utilised. Deferred tax assets are reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that the related tax benefit will be realised.

Subordinated liability

Subordinated liability relates to capital instruments issued to raise capital. The loan is a basic financial instrument which constitutes a financing transaction and is initially measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument. This is then subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Amortised cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fee or costs that are integral part of the effective interest rate. The effective interest rate amortisation is included in other charges in the statement of comprehensive income.

See Note 23 for details.

Insurance contracts

Product classification

Insurance contracts are those contracts when the insurance entities in the Group have accepted significant insurance risk from another party (the policyholder) by agreeing to compensate the policyholder if a specified uncertain future event (the insured event) adversely affects the policyholders. As a general guideline, the Group determines whether it has significant insurance risk by comparing benefits paid with benefits payable if the insured event did not occur. Insurance contracts can also transfer financial risk.

Once a contract has been classified as insurance contract, it remains an insurance contract for the remainder of its lifetime, even if the insurance risk reduces significantly during this period, unless all rights and obligations are extinguished or expire.

Gross written premiums

Gross written premiums comprise the total premiums payable for the whole period of cover provided by the insurance contracts entered during the reporting period, regardless of whether these are wholly due for payment in the reporting period, together with any adjustments arising in the reporting period to such premiums receivable in respect of business written in prior reporting periods. They are accounted for from the inception date of the policy to which they relate. Additional or return premiums are treated as a remeasurement of the initial premium. Gross written premiums are disclosed gross of commission payable to intermediaries and exclude taxes based on premiums.

Inwards reinsurance contracts are accounted for in the same way as direct business written, with acquisition costs (such as commissions and overriders) being recognised within acquisition costs.

Outward reinsurance premiums are accounted for in the same accounting period as the related insurance policies.

Insurance contracts (continued)

IT services fees

IT services revenue is generated from contracts for the licensing and development of the "Graile" insurance administration system, Revenue is recognised upon delivery of the service to the customer.

Underwriting agency commission

Underwriting agency commission revenue is recognised over time by allocating the commission due, to the periods in which the performance obligations in each contract are met.

Underwriting fees

Underwriting fees are generally fees charged to customers for underwriting and issuing a policy or bond. Income is recognised upon delivery of these services.

Acquisition costs

Acquisition costs comprise of direct costs arising from the conclusion of insurance contracts and are deferred over the period in which the related premiums are earned.

Deferred acquisition costs are costs arising from conclusion of insurance contracts that are incurred during the reporting period but which relate to a subsequent reporting period and which are carried forward to subsequent reporting periods. Deferred acquisition costs are amortised over the period in which the related premiums are earned.

Guarantee fund levies

Provision is made at the date of the statement of financial position for levies declared by the Financial Services Compensation Scheme based on premium income recognised in the financial statements and are deferred over the period in which the related premiums are earned.

Profit commission

Profit commissions are accounted for on an accruals basis.

Claims incurred (non-life contracts)

Claims include all claims occurring during the year, whether reported or not, related internal and external claims handling costs that are directly related to the processing and settlement of claims, a reduction for the value of salvage and other recoveries, and any adjustments to claims outstanding from previous years.

Reinsurance claims are recognised when the related gross insurance claim is recognised according to the terms of the relevant contract.

Insurance contracts (continued)

Claims incurred (life contracts)

Gross benefits and long-term business claims on life insurance reflect the cost of all claims arising during the year, including any related internal and external claims handling costs that are directly related to the processing and settlement of claims. Changes in the gross valuation of insurance are also included. Death claims and surrenders are recorded on the basis of notifications received. Maturities and annuity payments are recorded when due.

Reinsurance claims are recognised when the related gross insurance claim is recognised according to the terms of the relevant contract.

Claims outstanding

The outstanding claims provision is based on the estimated ultimate cost of all claims incurred but not settled at the reporting date, whether reported or not, together with related claims handling costs and reduction for the expected value of salvage and other recoveries. Other recoveries include any recovery of profit commissions due for contractual reasons. Delays can be experienced in the notification and settlement of certain types of claims, therefore, the ultimate cost of these cannot be known with certainty at the reporting date. The liability is calculated at the reporting date using a range of standard actuarial claim projection techniques, based on empirical data and current assumptions that may include a margin for adverse deviation. Where appropriate, valuations by independent actuaries have been used to value the outstanding claims and related reinsurance recoveries.

Outstanding claims liabilities over 1 year are measured as the central estimate of the present value of expected future payments against claims incurred at the reporting date with an additional risk margin to allow for the inherent uncertainty in the central estimate. The expected future payments are discounted to present value using a risk free rate.

Unearned premium reserve

The unearned premium reserve comprises the proportion of gross written premium which is to be earned in the following or subsequent financial years.

For policies with a defined period of insurance, the unearned premium reserve is calculated by apportioning premiums over the period to which they relate on a pro rata basis adjusted to take account of the incidence of risk.

In instances where the period of insurance is not finite, premiums are fully earned on the date of inception of the policy and an appropriate loss reserve is immediately created.

Reinsurance assets and liabilities

Contracts with reinsurers where the Group is compensated for losses incurred on insurance contracts issued are classified as reinsurance contracts held.

The benefits to which the Group is entitled under its reinsurance contracts held are recognised as reinsurance assets. These assets consist of short-term balances due from reinsurers, as well as longer-term receivables that are dependent on the expected claims and benefits arising under the related reinsured insurance contracts. Amounts recoverable from reinsurers are estimated in a manner consistent with the outstanding claims provision or settled claims associated with the reinsurer's policies and are in accordance with the related reinsurance contract.

The Group assesses its reinsurance assets for impairment on an annual basis. The Group monitors if a reinsurance asset is impaired by having regard to market data on the financial strength of each of the reinsurance companies. The impairment loss is recorded in the statement of comprehensive income.

Reinsurance liabilities are primarily premiums payable for reinsurance contracts and are recognised as an expense when due.

Gains or losses on buying reinsurance are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income immediately at the date of purchase and are not amortised. There were no such gains recognised in 2024 or 2023.

Ceded reinsurance arrangements do not relieve the Group from its obligations to policyholders.

Insurance receivables

Insurance receivables are recognised when due and measured on initial recognition at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable. Subsequent to initial recognition, insurance receivables are measured at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method. The carrying value of insurance receivables is reviewed for impairment whenever events or circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable, with the impairment loss recorded in the statement of comprehensive income.

Insurance receivables are derecognised when the derecognition criteria for financial assets have been met.

Insurance payables

Insurance payables are recognised when due and measured on initial recognition at the fair value of the consideration received less directly attributable transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition, they are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method. Insurance payables are derecognised when the obligation under the liability is settled, cancelled or expired.

Long term business provision ("LTBP")

The Group has chosen to use assumptions that are more consistent with the calculation of the best estimate liability ("BEL") under Solvency II regulation, while still maintaining a suitable level of prudence.

In particular, the approach allows for policy lapses with a margin of prudence included in the lapse rates, and also allows for negative reserves at the policy level, with zeroisation applied at the level of an overall risk characteristic group ("RCG"), should the LTBP be negative for that RCG. RCG means a group of policies which exhibit similar risk characteristics be they demographic, economic or otherwise in nature. The Group has chosen the individual territories in which business is written (i.e. Poland, Hungary, Czech Republic, Slovakia and Greece) as appropriate RCGs.

The approach for calculating the LTBP as at 31 December 2024 is consistent with the comparative year and is consistent with FRS 103 on Insurance Contracts.

The technical provisions are determined by the board of directors in consultation with the appointed actuary. Movements in the LTBP are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income. See Note 18.

Unexpired risk liability

Provision is made for unexpired risks arising from general business where the expected value of claims and expenses attributed to the unexpired periods of policies in force at the reporting date exceeds the unearned premiums provision in relation to such policies after the deduction of any deferred acquisition costs and related intangible assets. This is referred to as the liability adequacy test and is performed at the level of a portfolio of contracts that are subject to broadly similar risks and that are managed together as a single portfolio.

Fire brigade and other charges

A liability for fire brigade and other charges is recognised on business written to the reporting date. Levies and charges payable are expensed on the same basis as the recognition of premium revenue, with the portion relating to unearned premium being recorded as a prepayment.

Recognition of return on capital

Allocated investment return transferred to the general business technical account

The return on capital is transferred from the result of asset management to the result of insurance business based on average actuarial provisions on own account. The return on capital transferred is calculated based on an interest rate equivalent to the company's long-term return on investment.

Equity

Called up share capital is measured at par value for all shares issued and outstanding. When the shares are sold at a premium, the difference between the proceeds and the par value is credited to 'Share premium account'. Direct costs incurred related to equity issuance, such as underwriting, accounting and legal fees, printing costs and taxes are chargeable to 'Share premium account'.

'Profit and loss account' represents accumulated earnings/(losses) of the Group or Company (as appropriate) less dividends declared.

'Capital redemption reserve' represents the nominal value of Class B redeemable preference shares that was redeemed by Red Sands Life Assurance Company (Europe) Limited in 2015.

'Non-controlling interests' represents the non-controlling interest's share of the net amount of the identifiable assets, liabilities and provisions for contingent liabilities of the acquiree at the acquisition date as well as the non-controlling interest's share of post-acquisition profit or loss.

'Reserve for development cost' represents equity restricted for development expenses in relation to intangible assets.

Discontinued operations and assets held for sale

The Group recognises as discontinued operations components which have been disposed of and represent a separate major line of business or geographical area of operation.

The Group classifies the asset as held for sale if their carrying amounts will be recovered principally through a sale transaction rather than through continuing use. Assets held for sale are measured at the lower of their carrying amount and fair value less costs to sell. Cost to sell are the incremental costs directly attributable to the disposal of an asset.

The Group had an average of 198 employees (2023: 197) during the year. Included in wages and salaries is directors' remuneration of £3,375,613 (2023: £518,716). Audit fees for the year include tax compliance fees amounting to £302,690 (2023: £5,500) and £201,677 (2023: £316,488) payable to the auditor for other services in the year.

Other costs includes travel and other general expenditure.

9 Other income

Other income of £2,974,317 (2023: £2,287,441) relates to non-life business. Included in this balance is £997,830 (2023: £997,830) relating to the amortisation of negative goodwill and £1,727,429 (2023: £1,152,755) relating to net fees receivable from acting as an agent for the provision of deposit bonds. Other income of £65,314 (2023: £193,862) relates to the gains recognised at the point of recapturing obligations in accordance with the contractual provisions of the reinsurance treaties the Group has in its life business.

In December 2023, Generali signed an agreement with 4LifeDirect for the purchase of 100% ownership of the life insurance distribution company in Poland. As part of the transaction, the Company commuted its retrocession treaty and therefore, from 28 June 2024 the Company no longer retroceded policies in Poland. During 2023, the asset arising from this transaction qualified as an asset held for sale and was measured at its fair value less cost to sell. The asset was revalued prior to final settlement in 2024. Other income represents the gain on valuation of the asset to its fair value less cost to sell which is equivalent to the net transaction price of the commutation. The net transaction price of the commutation is the retrocession commutation sum due to the Company less the aggregate LCF balances on a best estimate basis.

12 Risk management policies

(a) Governance framework

The Group's activities expose the business to a number of key risks which have the potential to affect its ability to achieve its business objectives. The Board is responsible for the Group's internal control and for reviewing its effectiveness. The systems of internal control are designed to manage rather than eliminate risk and aim to provide reasonable and not absolute assurance.

The following describes the Group's financial and insurance risk management policies.

Underwriting and investment activities are monitored by committees of the regulated entities within the Group in accordance with terms of reference set by the respective Boards. The committees are assisted by external consultants as appropriate.

The Group maintains an efficient capital structure, consistent with the Group's risk profile and the regulatory and market requirements of its business.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the year ended 31 December 2024

12 Risk management policies (continued)

(b) Capital risk management objectives, policies and approach

Every subsidiary within the Group that is subject to regulatory capital requirements as a result of their insurance activities has met the required capital requirements at all times during the reporting period.

The Group's objectives when managing capital are to safeguard the Group's ability to continue as a going concern in order to protect policyholders, provide returns for the shareholders, to comply with the requirements of the relevant regulatory authorities, and to maintain financial strength to support new business growth. In order to maintain the capital structure, the Group may adjust the amounts of dividends paid, return capital to shareholders or issue new shares.

The regulator of each of the licenced subsidiaries specifies the minimum amount and type of capital that must be held and maintained at all times throughout the financial year.

One of the Company's subsidiaries, Red Sands Insurance Company (Europe) Limited, issued a EUR 20,000,000 subordinated note in 2015 at an issue price of 100% of the principal amount, which qualifies as Tier 2 Capital under Solvency II. The note is subject to a floating interest rate and will mature in January 2026. Further details are contained in Note 23.

(c) Insurance risk (non-life)

The risk under any one insurance contract is the possibility that the insured event occurs and the claim results. By the very nature of an insurance contract, risk is based on fortuity and is therefore unpredictable. The principal risks that the Group faces under its insurance contracts are that the business will be under-priced or under-reserved. The Group has developed its insurance underwriting strategy to diversify the type of insurance risks accepted to achieve a sufficiently large population of risks to reduce the variability of the expected outcome.

The Group also accepts reinsurance inwards, which are subject to the same risks as direct business.

A proportion of the Group's insurance risks are written by third parties under delegated underwriting authorities. The third parties are closely vetted in advance and are subject to tight reporting requirements. In addition, the performance of these contracts is closely monitored by underwriters and regular audits are carried out.

Details of the concentration of the Group's outstanding claim liabilities by type of contract are provided in note 5.

Key assumptions

The principal assumption underlying the liability estimates is that the future claims development will follow a similar pattern to past claims development experience. This includes assumptions in respect of average claim costs, claim handling costs, claim inflation factors and claim numbers for each accident year. Additional qualitative judgements are used to assess the extent to which past trends may not apply in the future, for example: once-off occurrence; changes in market factors such as public attitude to claiming; economic conditions; as well as internal factors such as portfolio mix, policy conditions and claims handling procedures. Judgement is further used to assess the extent to which external factors such as judicial decisions and government legislation affect the estimates.

Other key circumstances affecting the reliability of assumptions include delays in settlement and changes in foreign currency rates.

Sensitivities

The claim liabilities are sensitive to the key assumptions that follow. It has not been possible to quantify the sensitivity of certain assumptions such as legislative changes or uncertainty in the estimation process.

The following analysis is performed for reasonably possible movements in key assumptions with all other assumptions held constant, showing the impact on gross and net liabilities, profit before tax and equity. It should be noted that movements in these assumptions are non-linear.

By the very nature of an insurance contract, risk is based on fortuity and is therefore unpredictable. The principal risks that the Group faces under its insurance contracts are that the business will be under-priced or underreserved.

The Group also accepts reinsurance inwards in respect of life contracts, which are subject to the same risks as direct business.

The main risks that the Group is exposed to are as follows:

- Mortality risk risk of loss arising due to policyholder death experience being different than expected
- · Morbidity risk risk of loss arising due to policyholder health experience being different than expected
- Investment return risk risk of loss arising from actual returns being different than expected
- Expense risk risk of loss arising from expense experience being different than expected
- Policyholder decision risk risk of loss arising due to policyholder experiences (lapses and surrenders) being different than expected

These risks do not vary significantly in relation to the location of the risk insured by the Group or the type of risk insured.

Key assumptions

Material judgement is required in determining the liabilities and in the choice of assumptions. Assumptions in use are based on past experience, current internal data, external market indices and benchmarks which reflect current observable market prices and other published information. Assumptions and prudent estimates are determined at the date of valuation and no credit is taken for possible beneficial effects of voluntary withdrawals. Assumptions are further evaluated on a continuous basis in order to ensure realistic and reasonable valuations.

The key assumptions to which the estimation of liabilities is particularly sensitive are as follows:

· Valuation interest rate

The valuation interest rate is derived from the weighted average of the yields on the assets held at the valuation date and allocated to meet the mathematical reserves. These estimates are based on current market returns as well as expectations about future economic and financial developments.

An increase in valuation interest rate would lead to reduction in expenditure and an increase in profits for the shareholders.

Inflation

Consistent with the valuation rate adopted, the Group considers an appropriate inflation rate to be applied to the expenses which will be incurred in the future. The inflation rate assumed in each jurisdiction represents the expectation for inflation to increase in line with the monetary policy in each jurisdiction. A prudent margin is applied for potential adverse deviation.

An increase in rate will increase the expenditure and reduce profits for the shareholders.

· Mortality

The underlying mortality risks are based on either population mortality or relevant reinsurer risk-premium rate, depending on the nature of the product.

An increase in rates will lead to a larger number of claims (and claims could occur sooner than anticipated), which will increase the expenditure and reduce profits for the shareholders.

· Lapse and surrender rates (persistency)

The Group's methodology makes an allowance for lapses with the rate being set equal to the Solvency II best estimate assumption with a margin of prudence. Similar to the valuation on interest rate risk, depending on the mix of business, an increase or decrease in the Solvency II best-estimate lapse assumption may be prudent.

An increase in the lapse rate early in the life of the policy would tend to reduce profits for shareholders, but later increases are broadly neutral in effect.

· Expenses

The administration and claims handling expenses which will be incurred in the future are based on the current arrangements with administrators in each jurisdiction.

An increase in the level of expenses would result in an increase in expenditure thereby reducing profits for the shareholders.

The assumptions that have potential effect on financial statements of the Group are detailed in Note 18. As of 31 December 2024, the Company had £3,314,538 long term business provisions (2023: £83,452) and does not expect the impact of the volatility on the assumptions to be material.

(e) Financial risk

The Group is exposed to financial risk through its financial assets, financial liabilities, reinsurance assets and policyholder liabilities. In particular, the key financial risk is that the proceeds from the financial assets are not sufficient to fund the obligations arising from policies as they fall due. The most important components of financial risk are interest rate risk on cash flows, price risk, credit risk, liquidity risk and currency risk. The Group manages these positions to achieve investment returns in excess of obligations under insurance contracts.

(i) Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk that a counterparty will be unable to pay amounts in full when due. Key areas where the Group is exposed to credit risk are:

The Group monitors its exposure to any single counterparty, or groups of counterparties, and to geographical and industry segments. The Group's exposure to insurance receivables from policy holders and intermediaries is managed through the application of internal credit vetting processes and active credit control procedures. Wherever possible, the Group includes premium payment warranties in its terms and conditions which give it the right to cancel policies in the event of non-payment.

Reinsurance outwards is used to manage insurance risk. This does not, however, discharge the insurance entities in the Group from their liability as primary insurer where the issuing company issues direct insurance contracts. If a reinsurer fails to pay a claim, the primary insurer in the Group remains liable for the payment to the policyholder. The creditworthiness of reinsurers is considered on an annual basis by reviewing their financial strength. In addition, the recent payment history of reinsurers is used to update the reinsurance purchasing strategy.

The maximum exposure to credit risk at the date of the statement of financial position is represented by the carrying amount of each asset on the date of the statement of financial position. No financial assets are past due or impaired at the date of the statement of financial position and management expects no significant losses from the non-performance by these counterparties.

It is the Group's policy to maintain accurate and consistent risk ratings across its credit portfolio. This enables management to focus on the applicable risks and the comparison of credit exposures across all lines of business, geographic regions and products. The rating system is supported by a variety of financial analytics combined with processed market information to provide the main inputs for the measurement of counterparty risk. All internal risk ratings are tailored to the various categories and are derived in accordance with the Group's rating policy. The attributable risk ratings are assessed and updated regularly.

During the year, no credit exposure limits were exceeded.

The Group actively manages its product mix to ensure that there is no significant concentration of credit risk.

(ii) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that cash may not be available to pay obligations when due at a reasonable cost. The Group manages this risk by maintaining sufficient liquid assets or assets that can be converted into liquid assets at short notice and without capital loss to meet the expected cash flow requirements. The Group's investment guidelines to the investment managers sets out various short term cash requirements.

The table below summarises the maturity profile of the Group's financial liabilities based on remaining undiscounted contractual obligations, including interest payable, and outstanding claim liabilities based on the estimated timing of claim payments resulting from recognised insurance liabilities. Repayments which are subject to notice are treated as if notice were to be given immediately.

(iii) Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market risk comprises currency risk, interest rate and price risk.

· Currency risk

Currency risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in foreign exchange rates.

The Group has subsidiaries whose net assets are exposed to foreign currency translation risk. The Group is also exposed to currency risk in respect of its insurance business in currencies other than sterling. Currency risk is mitigated by maintaining financial assets denominated in the same currencies as its liabilities. The matching of assets and liabilities prevents economic exposure to currency risk but it does not prevent exposure to exchange gains or losses. The Group does not actively trade in derivatives, however, uses forward contracts to manage foreign exchange risk.

The Company was incorporated in the BVI on 8 January 2003 as an insurance holding company. On 3 June 2021, the Company redomiciled to Guernsey. Upon redomiciliation the authorised ordinary share capital converted from USD into GBP with each share having a value of GBP 0.82 per share.

As at 1 January 2022, MHL had 1,000 Class A preference shares in issue totalling £1m. During 2022, MHL issued 1,000 Class B preference shares for a subscription price of £20m. The preference shares have no par value in the capital of the company, may be redeemed by the Company at the Board's discretion and carry no mandatory dividends. From 27 February 2025 RSE will no longer write new or renewal business in relation to AFI. Additionally, from 1 January 2025 RSE has entered into a reinsurance to close arrangement to cede 100% of all claims payable and future premium relating to the remaining AFI book.

On 1st July 2025, as part of the group restructure, RSE and RSL executed a change of control whereby, the shares in these subsidiaries were transferred from RSG to CIG and RSG is in the process of being wound up. Similarly, on 15th August 2025, Nordic executed a change of control whereby, its shares were transferred from Cert. Holdings to CIG.
